I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a survey of the redemptive story in the major literary traditions of the New Testament, including an orientation to the historical backgrounds, religious context, literary forms, matters of canon, text, interpretation and critical issues. Particular emphasis will be given to the message of the New Testament documents.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To provide a foundational understanding of the New Testament documents as history and as Scripture, and as first-century literature, which serve as the intellectual basis of the Christian faith.
- 2. To survey the teachings and distinctive themes of the major New Testament literary traditions within their historical contexts and to appreciate their relevance for our contemporary life of discipleship.
- 3. To encourage further in-depth study of the New Testament documents by providing a framework for that study with the purpose of understanding, commitment, and informed Christian service.

VI. COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. New Testament Reading

Read the New Testament once through. Give a 'detailed' reading to those books that will be discussed at length in class (see 'Class Preparation' schedule).

2. Textbook Reading

Follow the 'Class Preparation' schedule and read the assigned chapters in your two volumes of <u>Exploring the New Testament</u>. This advanced reading will aid to learning during class time.

3. Research Assignment #1 -- 25%

Prepare an 8-10 page research paper on the following question:

Judaism of 'the second temple' period is key to understanding Jesus' life and work. Describe second temple Judaism as a worldview and demonstrate how its principles are so important for understanding the Jesus of the Synoptic Tradition?

Use a minimum of **5 research sources**. As a formal research assignment, follow the procedures outlined in <u>The Tyndale University College Essay Writing Guide</u>.

- 4. Research Assignment # 2 -- 25% Prepare a 7-page introduction to <u>ONE</u> of the following:
 - First Thessalonians
 - 1 Corinthians
 - Colossians
 - Philippians
 - Hebrews

• 1 John

Use a minimum of **5 research sources**, following the procedures outlined in <u>The Tyndale University College Essay Writing Guide</u>. The **structural outline** to follow for this assignment is:

- Historical Issues: Authorship, Date, Historical Situation of the Recipients, Other Historical Issues, etc.
- Literary Issues: Structure, Language, and Style, Special literary or grammatical features, etc.
- Theological Issues: Themes and Issues being discussed, Overall Purpose, etc
- Contemporary Relevance of the document

5. Final Examination -- 50%

The final exam will be held during exam week, as scheduled by the Registrar.

The final examination will be based on a list of research questions that will be handed out during the class period of **Week 2**. The research questions should be worked on during the semester from class lectures, personal research and textbook reading.
