I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Examines the principles of structuring and delivering sermons in a variety of genres, including expository, narrative, and evangelistic preaching, with particular attention to key theological themes emerging in different cultural contexts. Students will learn to address three important questions in homiletics: “What?” (knowing/content), “So What?” (feeling/emotion), and the “Now What?” (doing/will), in sermons that call forth genuine life changes, through the Holy Spirit. Students will have opportunity to preach in their own language of ministry and cultural context and receive peer and instructor feedback.

Prerequisites: BIBL 0501 Biblical Interpretation

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

(A) Identify the:

- Meaning and purpose of preaching / as communication for life change
- Meaning and practice of establishing biblical theology as the primary hermeneutic tool for understanding the historical, grammatical, literary and cultural context in preaching.
- Meaning of cultural Intelligence and cultural exegesis of the preacher and the sermon.

(B) Practice the use of cultural intelligence as a homiletical tool and understanding key theological themes emerging in different cultural contexts.

(C) Demonstrate capacity in the preparation and preaching of different functional types of sermon: especially the expository, the evangelistic, and the narrative to bring forth life change.

(D) Construct a philosophy and practice of preaching as worship, leadership and teaching in a missional, multicultural and multigenerational context in the New Generation Multicultural Church.

D. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

*All written assignments must be in neat legible handwriting or typed.

1. Sermons & Outlines: 25% x 3 = 75%

You will have the opportunity to preach 3 times in class or with your group as assigned.

For *each* of the 3 types (expository, evangelistic, narrative):

- (A) One 15-min. sermon. The sermon can be in English or language of your choice, provided we can find an instructor who can hear your sermon. The choice, however, should be based on the language that one will be using for your primary ministry.
- (B) One 1-page structural outline of each of the above sermons, which must include the following elements (to be submitted in English):
 - i. A preamble describing the occasion and the target audience;
 - ii. A statement of the homiletical idea / purpose;
 - iii. A near full script of the introduction and the conclusion;
 - iv. An outline of the body of the sermon down to two levels of subordination (i.e. main points and subpoints); indicate also points where illustrations will be inserted and a brief statement on each illustration.

Due on the day when the sermon is to be preached and submit the outline on the class page on Moodle.

2. Analytical Outline of one of your sermons preached in class: 20%

- (A) The analytical outline (3 pages) should reflect the result of your analysis of the text, on which your sermon is based. Refer to Worksheet for ANA Preaching in Kim & Wong: p165-167.
- (B) **Submit it together with all your notes and references cited, on the day when your sermon is preached to the class page.**

3. Class Exercise (as assigned): 5%

Class participation and small presentation of topics of interest to the class in groups.

B. Course Content

1. The **Theology and design of the Preaching Ministry** especially with cultural intelligence will be covered. The Life and life-long preparation of a Preacher will be examined. Theoretical issues such as the ‘post-modern and cultural debate of text, reader, and meaning’ will be engaged and its implication on the preaching in the New Generation Multicultural Church context will be drawn.
2. The preparation, the differences and uses of the **Topical Sermon, Evangelical Sermon** and the **Expository Sermon**. Practical guidance will be given for ‘mixed’ types. Exploration into the varieties of **Narrative Sermon**.
3. The design of sermon series, the relationship between preaching and leading, preaching as worship and its coordination with other aspects of Church ministries to bring forth congregation transformation will be discussed.
4. Significant time will be given to learn to understand the audience and to communicate that will connect and stay as well as **the practice of the ‘actual delivery of a message’**. **Feedbacks** will be given in class for the benefit of the whole class.
