#### I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Revised: June 22, 2023

Introduces preaching as a theological and pastoral practice of the church in service to the gospel. Topics include exegeting the biblical text and our contemporary context; principles of sermon design and delivery; and the character of the preacher. Two sermons are preached in class.

Prerequisites: BIBL 0501 Biblical Interpretation

### **II. LEARNING OUTCOMES**

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

# Cognitive:

- Articulate their own emerging theology of preaching and identity as a preacher
- Explain the basic elements of sermon design and delivery

### Affective:

- Demonstrate the conviction that the biblical text is the proper foundation for preaching, as God speaks good news through the preacher by the power of the Holy Spirit
- Address the needs of listeners in ways that are relevant and engaging
- Show confidence that God is dynamically present in the preaching event

### Skills:

- Interpret a biblical text and craft sermons that are coherent and compelling to hearers
- Develop greater proficiency in public speaking, Scripture reading and storytelling
- Analyze sermons in order to help them assess their own preaching and offer constructive feedback to peers
- Begin to form healthy weekly rhythm for longevity and health as a preacher

#### D. GUIDELINES FOR INTERACTIONS

Tyndale University prides itself in being a trans-denominational community. We anticipate our students to have varied viewpoints which will enrich the discussions in our learning community. Therefore, we ask our students to be charitable and respectful in their interactions with each other, and to remain focused on the topic of discussion, out of respect to others who have committed to being a part of this learning community. #### E. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

Primary assignments for this course include required readings and participation in weekly group discussions in class; writing a preacher's self-reflection; active participation in a weekly rhythm with daily journal writing; preaching two sermons, including the submission of written exegetical notes, a sermon manuscript and brief self-evaluation. These assignments are designed to guide your formation as a preacher and to also practice the art of crafting sermons.

1. Class Participation: Every week, self-grading to be combined with instructor's grading, due on last class; 10% of final grade.

Student participation in group discussions based on readings during class will be graded on a scale of 1 to 4. Students will give themselves a suggested grade and the final grade will be determined by the instructor. 1 (or D): present, not disruptive; responds when called on but does not offer much; infrequent involvement; 2 (or C): adequate preparation, but no evidence of interpretation of analysis; offers straightforward information; contributes moderately when called upon; 3 (or B): good preparation, offers interpretation and analysis, contributes well to discussion in on-going fashion; 4 (or A): excellent preparation, offers analysis, synthesis and evaluation of material; contributes significantly to ongoing discussion.

2. Preacher's Self-Reflection: Due Thursday, October 5; 15% of final grade.

In responding to the chapters written by Kim, Gibson, and Johnson from week 3 and what was discussed in class, write a 500 page (2 pages double spaced) self-reflection in addressing the following questions: How do you feel about preaching? Do you feel called to preach and why? What are some enduring pains or wounds that you tend to keep hidden? How could this effect your enjoyment of preaching (Kim, pp. 58)? What are some marks of spirituality maturity that you shine in and which ones are growing edges for you (Gibson, pp.68)?

3. Preacher's Rhythm Journal: Tuesday-Saturday from Tuesday October 3 to Saturday, November 17 (Reading break from October 23-27); 18% of final grade (5 weeks X 3% per week = 15% of final grade).

You will keep a daily journal from Tuesday-Saturday for 5 weeks as you act and reflect upon the following weekly rhythm for sermon preparation and formation as a preacher.

Tuesday: Reflect on the text Wednesday: Experience the text

Thursday: Study the text Friday: Craft the sermon Saturday: Practice the sermon

During class you will be placed in a preaching rhythm support group to share your experiences. This group will be your accountability in checking your journal each week and you will get marks for completing the rhythm each week.

**4. Preaching of sermons:** 60% of final grade (25% + 35%)

### **Sermon 1:** Due week 7; 25% of grade

You will choose a story from the Old or New Testament and do an exegetical study of the biblical text. You will take what is gleaned from your study and reflection and craft a one-point sermon that illustrates the gospel message that you have discerned and share the story in a compelling manner. Grades will be based on sermon manuscripts, exegetical notes, and presentation. Sermon must be a minimum 5 minutes and maximum 7 minutes. An extra half-minute grace will be given, anything beyond that a 1/3 grade reduction will be imposed (i.e. A to A-). You will submit exegetical notes, sermon manuscript and self-evaluation by uploading them to the Class page in the appropriate location. We will preach our sermons in small groups at dates to be determined by the groups.

**Sermon 2:** Due week 11; 35% of grade:

You will choose one passage from the preaching reflection journal and prepare an exegetical summary of the text you are preaching, based on the exegetical guideline presented in class. Identify and make use of at least two scholarly commentaries. The length of sermon will be 12-15 minutes. When you preach, you may use your manuscript, an outline or without notes, but you must submit a full sermon manuscript for evaluation; point form or outline is not acceptable. Sermon must be a minimum of 12 minutes and a maximum of 15 minutes, an extra minute grace will be given, anything beyond that a 1/3 grade reduction will be imposed (i.e. A to A-). You will submit exegetical notes, sermon manuscript and self-evaluation by uploading them to the Class page in the appropriate location. We will preach our sermons in small groups at dates to be determined by the groups.

# **Turnitin Text-Matching Software**

Tyndale has a subscription to text-matching software called Turnitin. This software is used to ensure the originality of academic writing and to check that all of the sources used have been cited correctly. The instructor for this course will be using this software for the assignments that are submitted through your course resource page at classes.tyndale.ca. When you submit your assignment, you will see a summary of your submission, which includes the file(s) that you submitted as well as a similarity report generated by Turnitin.


