I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Systematic Theology II is a continuation of Systematic Theology I. It endeavours to acquaint students with the thematic study of Christian doctrine according to the evangelical Protestant tradition. The following major doctrines will be considered: Christology, salvation, ecclesiology, approaches to world religions, and the last things.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES:

1. Attitudes:

- a. To increase appreciation for the value of theology in ministry and the Christian life.
- b. To increase confidence in the authority of Scripture.

2. Information:

- a. To introduce students to the basic materials for further theological reflection and study.
- b. To familiarize students with major theological issues and lines of theological disagreement.

3. Skills:

- a. To provide tools and skills for doing theological research.
- b. To stimulate students to think and apply theological insights to practical situations in ministry.

III. COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

A. REQUIRED TEXTS: (Must purchase)

B. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING:

1. Three Summaries of Required Readings: 15%

Write a four page summary of parts 4-10 of CTR. It could be in point form. The reports need not be exhaustive; it could focus on a few areas or figures of your interest. Students could choose three of the following. Note the due dates.

Due dates: Jan., 28 (part 4) or Feb., 25 (parts 5-6) or Mar., 18 (parts 7-8) or April 01 (parts 9-10).

2. A Sermon: 30%

In 8 pages, double-spaced, write a doctrinal sermon, showing the rationality and relevance of a particular doctrine. This exercise on communicating or making sense of doctrine does not require any homiletical training or discipline. Students are free to choose a topic that impassions them. Topics such as: how to make sense of the doctrine of Trinity? What is so good about "Good Friday"? Is two-nature Christology necessary? Why is it so important to be part of a local church? Why is it so crucial to affirm the ontological unity between the Father and the Son? Students are expected to incorporate their readings and understandings into the sermon. Thus **documentations are required**. For a sample of this exercise, students may consult with Peter K. Stevenson and Stephen I. Wright, [*Preaching the Incarnation*](#) (Louisville, Kentucky: Westminster/John Knox Press, 2010). **Due date: Feb., 13, 2013**

3. A Major Research Paper: 55%

The paper should be a substantial piece of theological analysis in response to one of the questions provided for this assignment (a list of essay topics or questions will be distributed in class). The essay should not simply report, summarize, or review class

materials (though you are encouraged to draw from class lectures, discussion and readings). It should, rather, concentrate upon theological (method or history) rather than biblical questions (though an understanding of biblical issues may be relevant to the argument of your paper). It should demonstrate thoughtful reflection, analysis, and should embody a conceptual argument in which various angles of the questions are explored in fairness and at length. The paper should be in the range of 12-15 pages in length, double-spaced, and contain rigorous documentations from at least 15 sources, eight of which must be journal articles. A range of 35 - 50 footnotes (not endnotes) is required. **Due date: April 05, 2013.**

1. Students must do the assigned readings from McGrath's *Christian Theology* (hereafter designated as CT) and his *Christian Theology Reader* (hereafter designated as CTR). Key figures such as Basil of Caesarea, Gregory of Nyssa, Origen, Anselm, Aquinas, Luther, Calvin, Zwingli, Barth, Moltmann, Jenson, etc. will be covered.
2. Students should read part I of CT, 4th ed., pp.1-98, the background materials which identify the periods, themes and personalities of Christian theology.
3. Students should familiarize themselves with *A Glossary of Theological Terms*, CT, pp. 465-471 or CTR pp. 579-585.
4. Classes will be conducted in lecture-format, although occasionally small group discussions on specific topics will occur.
5. Students should read all CTR readings, and acquaint themselves with them although in classes we will focus on selected texts to elucidate the topics discussed.
6. Occasionally, there will be guest lecturers when needed.
