#### I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores a range of historical and theological perspectives that contribute to the development of a theology of social service. The course has a specific, though not exclusive, emphasis on Salvationist theologies, tracing their development from William Booth through to the present day.

#### **II. LEARNING OUTCOMES**

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Articulate a rationale for, and some of the challenges associated with, the development of a theology of social services
- Outline the key historical and theological movements that have shaped this field since the late nineteenth century
- Meaningfully connect theological themes and images with current social services practice and experiences
- Provide a theological rationale that extends beyond social service delivery to engaging with social justice issues and movements

## D. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

## 1. Online Forum Participation: 20% of final grade

Questions that are designed to jointly explore responses to the weekly reading material will be provided at the end of each of the 12 modules. The purpose of these discussions is to build a learning community amongst students. While weekly interaction on these questions with other students is highly recommended, there will be **four specifically-identified topics** (see Course Schedule below) on which student input is evaluated for the purpose of assessment. Students should post their answers, responses or comments (no more than 300 words per post) on those four topics by the Friday of the selected weeks. **Each topic will count for 5% of the assessment**, making the total for this component 20% of the final grade. Grading will be based on: *evidence of engagement with the readings; demonstrating critical analysis; and, the development and articulation of one's own responses/views*.

# 2. Minor Essay: A Rich Branch of Theological Fruit (Due Friday, June 30; 30% of final grade)

The paper should be a concise articulation of the significance of one theological movement for the development of a theology of social service. Examples include (but are not limited to): the Social Gospel; Liberation Theology; Black Theology; Feminist Theology or any other contextual theology. The essay should demonstrate engagement beyond the class materials with wider readings and other sources. The work will pay attention to the historical precedents and the social context that led to the creation of this field of study. The paper should be in the range of 8-12 pages in length, double-spaced.

## Major Essay: A Foundational Idea for a Theology of Social Service (Due Friday, August 4; 50% of final grade)

The paper should be a substantial exploration of the significance of a single theological metaphor in the development of a theology of social service. Examples include (but are not limited to): the Kingdom of God; Imago Dei; a parable by Jesus; social holiness; and hospitality. The essay should not simply report, summarize, or review class materials,

but demonstrate engagement with wider readings and other sources, including experience. It should show thoughtful reflection, analysis, and build a strong argument that leans on a considerable body of evidence to connect the chosen theme with the everyday practice of social service delivery. The paper should be in the range of 15-20 pages in length, double-spaced.

## **E. EQUITY OF ACCESS**
