I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Revised: November 14, 2022

Designed to give insight into the ministry of spiritual direction. An experience in learning through an informational as well as formational process. There are readings, lectures, periods of reflection, daily community worship, journaling, and student interaction through a smallgroup process. Includes a mandatory off-campus retreat at an additional cost. Limited enrolment.

Prerequisites: SPIR 0700 or permission of the professor.

This course will be held off-site at Queen of Apostles Renewal Centre in Mississauga ON; delivered in-person with synchronous online option. There are certain limitations to the online option. You will not be able to participate fully in the life of the community such as daily worship and group building exercises etc. The additional cost for this retreat option is \$600.00, which includes accommodation (private room plus a private bathroom and shower), meals, coffee breaks and all the other facilities such as classrooms, chapel, and hiking paths. Students will pay Queen of Apostles directly when they arrive. They take different types of payments (e.g. credit cards, e-transfers, etc.). Please contact Dr. Sherbino for further enquiries.

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Recognize the process of spiritual formation.
- 2. Discern and identify the movement of God in a person's life.
- 3. Gain and restate a biblical and theological foundation for spiritual direction.
- 4. Evaluate religious experiences.
- 5. Foster and practice contemplative attitude.
- 6. Construct a healthy relationship between the director and the directee.
- 7. Describe and affirm a code of ethics in spiritual direction.

E. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

1. Critical Book reviews: 40% of final grade.

From the required reading list submit a two page critique for each of the four books. Each critique should focus on ONE issue raised in the book and should reflect thoughtful interaction with the issue raised in the text.

Due Date: June 16, 2023.

This meets learning outcomes 1, 2, 3 and 5.

2. Journal Exercise: 20% of final grade.

You will be required to journal each day. At the end of the course, you are required to write a 3-5 page reflection paper that captures the essence of your learning and the integration from the daily group experience in Lectio Divina.

Due Date: May 29, 2023

This meets learning outcomes 2,3 and 5.

3. Research Paper: 40% of final grade.

Write a 10-15 page research paper on the topic, "A Model of Spiritual Direction." You are expected to do research on one author to discover their unique approach to spiritual direction and how you would integrate some of their concepts of spiritual direction into your own practice. This paper is expected to follow all the requirements for a research paper as set forth in the student handbook. A minimum of eight resources is expected.

Due Date: July 5, 2023

This meets learning outcomes 1,2,3,4, 6, and 7.
