### **C. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING**

#### **1. Critical Book reviews: 40% of final grade**

From the required reading list submit a two-page critique for each of the four books. Each critique should focus on ONE issue raised in the book and should reflect thoughtful interaction with the issue raised in the text.

This meets learning outcomes 1, 2, 3 and 5.

**2. Journal Exercise: 20% of final grade**

You will be required to journal each day during the week of instruction. At the end of the course, you are required to write a 3–5 pages reflection paper that captivates the essence of your learning and the integration from the daily groups experience in Lectio Divina.

**Due Date: May 29, 2026**

This meets learning outcomes 2, 3 and 5.

**3. Research Paper: 40% final grade.**

Write a 10–15 pages research paper on the topic, “A Model of Spiritual Direction.” You are expected to do research on one author to discover their unique approach to spiritual direction and how you would integrate some of their concepts of spiritual direction into your own practice. This paper is expected to follow all the requirements of a research paper as set forth in the student handbook. A minimum of eight outside resources is expected in this research.

**Due Date: June 26, 2026**

This meets learning outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7.

**Late Penalty:** Assignments submitted late will incur a penalty of 10% per week.

Please be aware that Turnitin can also detect AI-generated content from tools like Grammarly, so students should be mindful of when using such software. ### **Research Ethics**

### **Late Papers and Extensions Policy**

All papers and course assignments must be submitted by the due dates indicated in the course syllabus. Unless the instructor already has a policy on grading late papers in the course syllabus, grades for papers submitted late without an approved extension will be lowered at the rate of two-thirds of a grade per week or part thereof (e.g., from "A+" to "A-," from "B" to "C+"). Please note that some programs, such as cohort-based or intensive courses, may follow a different policy due to the nature of the program.

Faculty may not grant an extension beyond the last day of exams for the semester. Requests for extensions beyond this date must be addressed in writing to the Registrar by filling out the [Extension Request Form](#).
