I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

An interdisciplinary course about biblical, theological and historical models of individual and corporate prayer. The purpose of this course is to provide an introduction to the theology and practice of prayer in the Judaeo-Christian tradition. This course will help us to discover the richness of our heritage in the understanding and practice of prayer. This will happen through the exploration of the experience of prayer in both the Old and New Testaments, as well as history of the Church. It will also examine the place of prayer in both the life of the individual and the community.

Prerequisite: SPIR 0700

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Construct a Scripturally based theology of prayer
- 2. Practice several personal and corporate practices of prayer from different ages and theological traditions
- 3. Guide others in these practices

D. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

1. Reading Assignments (10% x 4 = 40% of Final Grade)

This assignment is related to Outcomes 1 and 3.

There are four books to read in this course, and each one has an associated written assignment. These assignments help to apply the reading and provide you with a practical tool you can use later in your personal life and/or ministry. These assignments are due on a Saturday at midnight ET (no extensions).

- Read Brueggemann's *Spirituality of the Psalms* and create a teaching plan to explain his three categories of Psalms and how to pray them. (8 pages, due September 24th)
- Read Tiessen's *Providence and Prayer* and write a paper summarizing each of the eleven models he describes and then conclude by explaining which model appeals to you and why. (12 pages, due October 15th)
- Read Hallesby's *Prayer* and write a personal letter as if you were Hallesby explaining to a new Christian how to pray. Be sure to avoid church jargon! (8 pages, due November 5th)
- Read Fryling's *Seeking God Together* and prepare a handout and plan to introduce a group of people to group spiritual direction. (4 pages, due November 19th)

2. Prayer Practice Reflections (5% x 4 = 20% of Final Grade)

This assignment is related to Outcomes 2 and 3.

You will practice four prayer exercises during this course. Details about each practice will be provided in the course material. Reflect on your practice in a 2-3 page paper where you answer three questions:

- What was stirring, impactful and energizing about the prayer exercise?
- What was difficult, awkward or off-putting about the prayer exercise?
- Now that you've tried it out, what questions do you have about the exercise?

These reflection papers are due on a Tuesday at midnight ET (no extensions).

- From September 28th to October 4th, pray the Psalms using the four different ways described in the course material (reflection paper due October 4th).
- From October 5th to 18th, meditate on Scripture using each of the three approaches described in the course material 3-4 times (reflection paper due October 18th).
- From November 2nd to 15th, play Laubach's Game with Minutes or practice fixed-hour prayer (reflection paper due November 15th).
- Sometime between November 21st and 29th, lead a group spiritual direction session (reflection paper due November 29th).

3. Weekly Discussion Forums: 4% x 10 = 40% of final grade

This assignment is related to Outcomes 1-3.

There will be 10 forums in total and each forum will have a discussion question. Students will post their responses by midnight on Wednesday, and comment on at least two posts of other students by midnight on Saturday. Your post for each question should be about 200-

250 words. Each post should be concise, addressing the issues in the question with reference to class readings/lectures, and demonstrate critical thinking (e.g. further questions or issues raised, application to your context). Your comments to fellow students would be briefer (about 100-125 words), with an affirmation (perhaps from your experience or readings) and a thoughtful question for that student's further reflection.

E. EQUITY OF ACCESS
